- 1. Call to order by Chairperson Joy Morrison at 6:00 pm
- 2. Roll call: Morrison, Espinosa, Merritt, Prudhon, Poock, Fuson, Hamilton. Also present were Ian Rigg, Ray Anderson, Angie Olsen, Leah Hurtley, Mayor Bill Hurtley
- 3. Motion to approve the agenda made by Prudhon and seconded by Merrit. Approved by voice vote.
- 4. Motion to waive the reading of the April 22, 2020 minutes and approve them as printed made by Espinosa and seconded by Prudhon. Approved by voice vote.
- 5. Citizen appearances other than agenda items listed: None
- 6. New business: Morrison inquired about installing the nets at the tennis courts at Leonard/Leota Park. Tennis falls under Phase 1 of the Rock County recommended reopening guidelines. Ray plans to get them up the week of the 18th.
- 7. COVID 19 Response:
 - A. Soccer: The soccer club will not have any organized activity this year. Decision was made to leave the goal nets in place although no city sanctioned events would take place.
 - B. Pool operations: City Administrator Rigg enclosed his recommendation on the pool which is to not open it for the 2020 season. The PRB members discussed the following issues. Could the CDC guidelines be met with current staffing levels? Since the current Rock County guidelines would limit the or eliminate swim lessons and the inability of the city to sell season passes there would be a significant drop in revenues that help support the pool. How can the safety of the pool patrons and pool staff be insured? How will the pandemic concerns impact attendance numbers? Mayor Hurtley indicated that any motion made by the PRB would be a recommendation for the Common Council to consider due to the financial implications on the city budget. Poock made a motion to hold a special session of the PRB on June 8 to discuss the status of the pool for the 2020 season and determine the recommendation for the Common Council. Seconded by Hamiliton and approved by voice vote.

C. Baseball: The program could not be modeled in the same way as past years. Only 9 coaches have signed up as compared to 19 coaches from 2019. The coaches are willing to try do more "clinics" to teach fundamentals since there aren't enough coaches to conduct games. Under Phase 1 of the Rock County guidelines team sports are not recommended. Would a baseball fundamentals clinic fall under the exercise category which would be allowable if the number of attendees at the clinic were limited and activities could guarantee proper distancing. Motion to consider a clinic approach to baseball at the June 16 meeting made by Poock, with a second by Merrit. Chairperson Morrison asked for a roll call vote: Espinosa no, Fuson no, Hamiliton no, Merit yes, Pock yes, Prudhon no, Morrison no. Motion fails to pass by a vote of 5 to 2. Motion to have the city staff investigate moving to a clinic made by Espinosa and sconded by Prudhon. Morrison requested a roll call vote: Prudon yes, pock no, Hamilton yes, Fuson yes, Espinosa yes, Morrison no, Merrit yes, Motion carries 5 to 2.

Jon Frey appeared to update the Jays season, the Home Talent League has been postponed until July 4 and hopes to start the season then. The Thursday night league will not be held. The Sunday games will remain if the season is held. Jon plans to update again at the June meeting.

A review of the guidelines for parks and playground equipment and park shelter rentals.

- 8. Parks report: The summer crew has started. Mowing has started. Ray received estimates for cameras for the Park even though there are still some concerns about placement and the expense. Hope to have the Geese Away solution installed by late July. Thanks to Reverend Poock for doing a volunteer clean up day. The formal Adopt a Park program has not been launched due to the pandemic.
 - A. Dog Park: \$14,822 for the fencing, depending on the budget it could start in fall of 2020 or be moved to 2021. The fencing should be an expense born by the city in case there is a decision to move the dog park at a later date.
- 9. Pool report: Badger Pool did the annual cleaning and will be sending someone out to inspect and give a quote on repair.
 - A. Referendum The final referendum language needs to go to the Common Council. Rigg is requesting the town of Union to also place a referendum on their ballot since there has been an increase the cost of construction.
 - B. Cost estimates: Rigg is investigating the cost difference if the pool was relocated to different location for comparison and see if substantial savings may be available in a location that won't require the amount of earth moving as the current location.
 - C. Fundraising The referendum would raise \$5 million leaving \$3 to \$3.5 million at the current estimated cost. The Town of Union would be asked to contribute \$1 million and the remaining would need to be raised through contributions.

Badger Pool came out to inspect the leakage issues ten days ago but has still not delivered an estimate. The company cannot assure that the issues could be fixed. The time frame for repairs, if possible, could be several days away and then it would need 48 hours to cure before the pool could be filled. If the pool cannot be repaired it cannot be filled. Costs to make repairs is undetermined but could be significant. At this point it would reduce the season to six weeks.

The Covid issues:

Can we get supplies? On a smaller scale, it seems they would be available in quantities to meet the needs of the Aquatic Center. Other concerns were based on the ability to meet both the CDC and Rock County guidelines. Many other area pools are closed or making the decision in the next few days.

Financial Impact due to repairs and delayed opening:

The FY20 pool budget project revenues of \$50,000 between swim lessons, swim team, and season passes. Due to the delay in opening and uncertainty to when the pool could open due to the unknown repair schedule and costs, the revenue estimate would drop by at least half. Projected income may be about half this year. The FY 20 city budget projected expenses were \$88,000 including some repairs. The expenses would also decrease. While difficult to estimate, the additional difference in loss could be \$10,000.

Poock moved that the Park and Recreation Board recommend to the Common Council the pool open during the 2020 season if it can open by July 1. Motion died for lack of second.

Poock moved that the Park and Recreation Board recommend to the Common Council the pool open during the 2020 season if it can open by July 1 and the repair expense is capped at \$20,000. Second by Hamilton.

Dear City of Evansville and Park Board Members,

The Evansville Home Talent Baseball Club, Inc (aka Jays) is respectfully requesting support from the City to revise the reference letter to allow our volunteer community organization to offer full concessions during our baseball games at the park.

A few points to consider:

- Evansville Jays have been excellent stewards of the City property at the upper diamond, including pre-game preparation, maintenance, and improvements since 2005.
- Jays are the only organization to sell concessions during games at the upper diamond.
- Jays have limited financial support in 2020, so concessions sales are a big part of our business plan for operations and park improvements.
- A positive change by the City, allowed outdoor sales per Section 130-561 for businesses to operate pick-up food sales during the past few months (i.e. bowling alley, etc). This was an excellent move by the City to support local businesses.
- The City is allowing local food trailers to serve their customers (i.e. Rock County Dairy, Twisted Cone, etc). These are great businesses and organizations for the Evansville community's mental and social health. Brodhead has similar food trailers operating.
- Jays concessions stand operates nearly the same as food trailers and carry outs at local restaurants over the past few months with those restaurants now allowed to have dine in eating.
- Already this summer, a number of Home Talent Baseball games have been played with concessions.
- According to <u>CDC website</u>: "Currently there is no evidence to support transmission of COVID-19 associated with food."
- Jays will make all reasonable measures to protect our community during our games.

Again, the Jays are kindly asking for a revision to the reference letter, specifically around the use of the concession stand.

I will plan on attending the Park Board meeting on June 16. Please share this letter with other members of the Park Board prior to the meeting and include this letter in the meeting agenda packet.



Participation

A survey was administered in spring 2020 using the services from Polco. From the data they we able to determine that 162 people participated. Of the 162 who participated, 108 were able to be identified as registered voters within Evansville City limits. There was some concentration in the Town of Union with participation in other townships to a lesser extent.

Analysis

Of the common features, a safe pool for little children and toddlers had the highest appeal (24%) while other features like slides, new bath house, deck space and energy efficiency received (14-18%). The rebuild and connection to the parks store and the front access to the pool received the lowest rating (6-7%).

On the differences between the 3 Concepts, the idea of a separate swim area to accommodate multiple functions received the highest preferences. The 6 lane feature for swim competitions received less of a preference in Question 4 over having two separate swim areas. The same 6 lane feature in Question 3 was preferred over the deep well for diving and drop slide but did not get a majority. Removing the deep well was the least preferred of all the individual concepts in Questions 2-4. Concept 3 which had the removal of the deep well received a near tie in preference while Concepts 1 and 2 which had the deep well received more favorable results.

Conclusion

Concept 1 includes the most preferred options of survey participants. This concept included two large distinct swim areas, keeping the diving and drop slide available, and having a kiddle pool. I recommend that we use Concept 1 in our financial planning and public communication.

Re: Request for Referendum Question Regarding a New Community Aquatic Center on November 2020 Ballot.

The City of Evansville is requesting the Town of Union to consider placing a referendum on the November 2020 ballot for the construction of a new aquatic center that is enjoyed by many in the Town of Union. While others outside of our two communities still visit the current aquatic center, we estimate those with an Evansville address but not within City limits are about 25-35% of total visitors. This was determined reviewing registration of pool passes as a sample of the total population that visits as those with season passes are the more predominate users of the facility.

The City is seeking solidarity through shared costs in the construction of what can be an amazing feature to this larger community. There are different methods to determine what a commitment amount should be. Combined tax valuation between the Town of Union and the City of Evansville would make the split approximately 31% (Union) to 69% (Evansville). However this could be arguable inequitable as value does not mean use.

Therefore our request is based on need, not to exceed what could be considered an equitable contribution level. The City is faced with the project ranging in costs from \$7.5 million to \$8.8 million depending on final location and design. The City will attempt to raise \$1.3 million and through referendum ask for \$5 million over 20 years for the pool alone. This leaves a \$1,200,000 to \$2,500,000 gap in financing of the project.

The City is requesting the Town of Union to bond for 15% of the costs to construct not to exceed \$1,200,000. This would create an approximate debt service payment of \$80,400 at 50 base points higher than current rates for General Obligation Bonds over a 20 year period. I would recommend that the Town of Union consult with its financial advisor or bonding attorney if you were to go to the citizens for a referendum vote.

It is not lost on the City that people are hurting at the moment with the recent economic impact of COVID 19. Through different financing options such as using a Note Anticipation Note first the


City does not expect the first payment to come from the tax payers until November 2023. Predicting the financial situation of our residents three years from now, then the following 20 years while the bond is being paid, is not possible. We chose the date of November 2020 as most likely election to gain the greatest possible number of voters to voice their opinion while meeting the remaining life expectancy of the current pool. While we are confident the majority of people are in favor of a new pool, we cannot predict how recent events will alter their decision at the ballot box.




